Message from the TCHS Board of Directors

We can't believe it's already 2024!

Unfortunately, we are still dealing with the fallout from the post-COVID population boom and increased costs. As a consequence, we continue to see record numbers of unintended litters and unwanted animals. But we are not giving up and we hope you won't either!

We will continue to spay and neuter cats and dogs – both homeless and owned animals, we will keep providing support to animal owners to reduce surrenders and abandoned animals, and we'll keep rescuing as many as we can – the sick, the vulnerable, the unwanted, and those left behind.

During 2023, TCHS has achieved the following:

- Trap-neuter-vaccinate-return (TNR) of 800 community cats.
- Spay or neuter of over 303 owned cats.
- Spay or neuter of 286 owned dogs.
- Emergency food and veterinary assistance for dozens of pets to help keep vulnerable animals in the home and out of the shelter.
- Foster and rescue of over 600 cats, puppies, kittens, and dogs.

We have spent over \$61,000 on veterinary bills alone during 2023 – on TNR, spay and neuter, and the care of animals in our community and with our pet fosters. Just as important as our financial impact is the fact that as an all-volunteer organization our volunteers devote thousands of hours of their time (all un-compensated) and thousands of dollars on food and supplies and gas money, at their own expense, to carry out our mission.

Our Mission

At TCHS, our core mission is to enhance the lives of animals in Carroll and Grayson Counties and the City of Galax.



We work to fulfill this mission by reducing the population of unwanted animals through TNVR and spay/neuter assistance. And we work to improve the lives of animals that are part of our community through our foster and rescue program, emergency medical assistance, and free or low-cost vaccination and pet food programs.

These programs don't just help animals; they also help the people who love them by allowing them to keep their beloved pets at home and out of the shelter.


Community Cats

During 2023 our volunteers provided care to community (or feral) cats in the form of trap-neuter-vaccinate-return programs (TNVR) where we trap feral cats and get them spayed or neutered and vaccinated against rabies.

We also provide any needed medical care, such as wound treatment or control of parasites. And we follow up with colonies to re-trap any cats that become sick or injured.



We provide support to several feral cat colonies throughout the Twin Counties in the form of food, medical, and housing assistance.




While adult cats are released back to the location from which they were trapped, if kittens are present, we will take them into our foster program for socialization and adoption.


Spay and neuter (dogs)

Because our major homeless pet population consists of cats, this is where we focus our spay and

neuter efforts. Most of our homeless and feral cats arise from owned animals that were abandoned or left behind and allowed to procreate without anyone to care for them.

Dog and Cat Rescue

TCHS also takes in homeless and unwanted animals in the Twin Counties, providing foster care and any needed veterinary care until we can either adopt out the animals locally or transfer them to our regional rescue partners for adoption.



Owner Support Programs

TCHS also provides services to local pet owners to help improve the affordability of owning pets, which helps keeps pets in their home and out of the shelter.

271 pets vaccinated
320 dogs and cats microchipped
112 pets given emergency food
66 pets given emergency medical support
24 cat houses provided





In addition to our ongoing spay and neuter certificate program we also host (with our partners) free or low-cost vaccination clinics, emergency pet food support, and emergency veterinary medical subsidies.



We also provide support for our cat colony feeders in the form of food, housing, and ongoing medical care for cats that show signs of illness or injury.



Dog and Cat Transport



Because we don't have enough adoptive local homes for all of the animals in our community that need homes, most dogs and cats rescued during 2023 were transported to regional rescue partners.

TCHS is fortunate to

foster care heroes.



Many of the animals in our care need veterinary and nutritional support - in addition to basic medical care like vaccination, deworming, and spay or neuter - in order to move on to the next phase of their lives. But the most important ingredient is LOVE!





TCHS Helpline

Our TCHS volunteers received and responded to over 1,400 requests for help, through calls or texts to our helpline, emails, Facebook messages, and direct appeals to our members.

While TCHS personnel are all volunteers, and many have regular jobs, we respond to all requests for assistance as quickly as possible.




Volunteers (are the best)!

Looking Ahead: Outdoor dog assistance program

There are just too many dogs living in sub-standard conditions in our community. While we understand that many dogs are going to live outdoors, despite our preferences, we often find that they do not have suitable housing, bedding, food, and veterinary care.

Total: \$81,307






- Program services (89%)


